





In 92CF002529 I was found "not guilty" by a jury.

Case 92CF002803 was dismissed.

Case 92CM000188 was dismissed as well.

Case 93CF000621 was also dismissed.

In 93CF001190 I pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance (class IV Felony) and was sentenced to 18 months of probation on 12-19-93.

In 94CF001308 I pled guilty to possession of cannabis and violated my probation. I was resentenced to 24 months of probation on 8-12-94.

On 5-14-97 I was unsuccessfully discharged from probation. I did pay all fines and went through drug treatment however I did not complete all of the tasks stipulated in the agreement.

At present I have no pending cases or court appeals.

I have never petitioned this body for executive clemency in any case.

My name is Aaron O. Ammons and I was born on and two daughters (

. My life has taken a different course since my adolescence and young adult years and I attribute that to several different reasons. However, I truly believe I would have had trouble staying the course if it were not for the fact that I have been happily married to my wife, Carol Ammons, for 13 years. Carol and I met at Chanute Transition Center in 1999-2000. Chanute was a transitional facility for young men who were being released from Juvenile incarceration. I was recruited to work there by Dr. Patrick Nizzi who thought my passion for youth and learning would be an asset to the program. As much as I love Carol and our family, they are not my foundation. My family sits upon the foundation of truth, love, dignity and integrity that Carol and I both decided to stand upon and we are teaching our children to do the same.

Today I seek a pardon for a crime I committed on December 17, 1993. I plead guilty to possession of a controlled substance and was sentenced to 18 months of first offenders probation. Before I completed that sentence I violated my probation by being caught in possession of marijuana and thus I was resentenced to 24 months of probation.

Prior to being convicted, I had already attained my diploma from Champaign Central High School and although I had not earned an Associates Degree, I had completed over 50 credit hours at Parkland Junior College also located in Champaign, IL. During my time at Central High I was a consistent B average student, member of the track team my sophomore year and I was one of the starting guards on the basketball team from 1985-1989. I went on to play basketball at Parkland College for two years under Coach Tom Cooper before choosing to leave college and explore the street life.

Although there was significant dysfunction in my home, my dad was a handyman who worked intermittently and even sold drugs to make ends meet. He often used the drugs he set out to sell and too often he was physically and mentally abusive to my mother. She was no saint but she worked two and three jobs for years and made tremendous sacrifices for us. She was a heavy marijuana and cigarette smoker herself, but they both did the best they could to give me and my siblings, sound guidance, discipline and a clear understanding of the importance of education. Hence, I came from a home that had its share of good and bad examples but I was not "forced" into a life of crime. I was lured in by the appearance of power and I was eventually trapped by the very drugs I thought would bring me prestige.

I dabbled enough in the drug lifestyle to see the violence, destruction of families, loss of dignity and overall distraction it really is. Of the ten years I spent enduring that lifestyle I was addicted to "mack balls", a mixture of marijuana and crushed crack cocaine, for seven to eight of those years. On a couple of occasions, I managed to save 5-10 thousand dollars, only to spend it on more drugs, clothes, used cars, etc., but I certainly never found the lasting power or joy it appeared to offer.

I sold drugs mainly to pay for my habit. I spent about 100 dollars a day on those laced joints for several years and it destroyed my relationships with my parents, my friends and my girlfriend. I managed to maintain my habit and work odd jobs for a while. Eventually I stopped selling all together and started paying for my drugs with the money I had earned at work. Of course that led to living in the dark with no power and eventually being evicted from my home. If at any time I suffered from mental illness, this was definitely it!

The loss of dignity that resulted in me doing things I would never have done in my right mind pushed me to what we call "rock bottom", no pun intended. I stole \$20 from my great Uncle who I absolutely adored and that was the lowest point of my life, rock bottom! I had thoughts of suicide and I blamed everyone from the white man, to my parents, to God for my situation but I found a glimmer of hope in something very simple, poetry. I began to write poem after poem releasing my anger, hurt, frustration and confusion which resulted in moments of love, clarity and purpose. I began to read and study more and more about culture, history, politics, religion and family.

Self-Education and spiritual awareness helped me break the bondage of addiction and self-pity. Part of my "self-education" included a three year study course with a civil rights strategist who served directly with Dr. King. The classes taught 'Character and Self-hood', 'Marriage', 'Government', 'Citizenship', etc.

Today I have two books of poetry (<u>Journey Through Another Man's Mind</u> and <u>As I Travel My Creation</u>), I have penned hundreds of poems, published numerous poems in journals such as The Black Scholar, The Griot and the Public ((i)) newspaper. I used my passion and appreciation for poetry to teach the power of this form or art to a group of 6th and 7th grade African-American boys in 2007. The class resulted in them publishing their own book of poetry entitled <u>Gone CA'zy</u>; The Future of Young Hip-Hop Poets. I have also been the host and coordinator of an open mic poetry set called S.P.E.A.K. CAFÉ on the campus of the University of Illinois for the past 8 years. The poetry set is a civic engagement program with Krannert Art Museum in partnership with the Dept. of African-American Studies.

I have been clean and sober for 14 years. During my years of sobriety, I have continued my academic studies as well as what I refer to as self-education. I am currently enrolled in the BGS Program through Eastern Illinois. This is a program that allows adults to earn a General Education Degree by taking classes on-line or in person, while continuing to work. Due to my extremely busy life I have not completed all of the course work as of yet but I have taken several classes on-line through Eastern and because the program allows me to take classes at other Illinois Educational institutions, I have taken 8 classes at the University of Illinois. I anticipate having my degree within the next 3 years. One of the benefits of working at the University of Illinois is that I am allowed to take classes for free. Although there must be room in the class in order for me to attend, if available, I only have to purchase my books; the instruction is there for those employees who want to take advantage of it.

I have been a building service worker at the U of I for 14 years. During those years, I have earned just over 24 credits, been selected by management to teach the EPP program, (a model of ergonomically correct ways to lift, push, pull, reach, etc. without causing serious injury to self or others) and I have received awards of appreciation for my outstanding ability to teach and train my co-workers.

Another aspect of my employment at the University has been my role as President of our Service Employees International Union or SEIU for short. I have been intricately involved as a steward, chief Steward, member of the negotiating team, Vice President and now President of Chapter 119. My employment with the University of Illinois has opened my eyes to the real value of having dignity and integrity. During my tenure, I have received many informal offers to take a management position with the University. These offers highlight how much they appreciate my input during management meetings; it's obvious to me that the management team believes in my ability to communicate and my fair disposition toward management and my co-workers. When there's a need for representation, the members look to me regardless of the situation or the area in which they work.

I see my work as a representative for my co-workers and the relationships I have with members of management as motivation for me. Instead of ego tripping or becoming arrogant I simply remember the time when I had lost my dignity and integrity and very few people even wanted to be in my presence. I know that the change in my life is due to my commitment to logic and truth and I refuse to forget it.

The same principles that led me to positions of influence in the work force and in my union, also led me to start two social justice organizations with political arms as well. In 2001-2002 I cofounded Champaign-Urbana Citizens for Peace and Justice (CUCPJ) and in 2012, I founded Citizens with Conviction (CWC). CUCPJ is a profound group of concerned citizens who have met almost every Saturday at 4p.m. for the past 12 years to address issues around Criminal Justice reform, (Electoral) Political Awareness and Environmental Racism. Our work is so extensive that it is futile for me to start listing our accomplishments and impact on the community. I will say that when the local Urban League chapter was closed and our NAACP was in shambles, the people looked to CUCPJ to fill that void, and they still do. For more information please google CU Citizens for Peace and Justice or visit www.cucpj.org. CWC is comprised of ex-offenders, or as I prefer to call us, Citizens with Conviction. The mission of CWC is to educate ourselves and the community about the issues formerly incarcerated or convicted citizens. Our initiatives began by working with other organizations like All of Us or None, based in Oakland, CA. to address barriers to employment and political disenfranchisement. As the president of CWC, I attended a conference in Detroit, MI and Los Angeles, CA where we explored policy changes that included Ban the Box legislation at the state and local level. We have since successfully worked with the City of Urbana Human Relation Commission to enforce Ban the Box policy in the City of Urbana.

As it relates to commissions and boards, I was recently recruited to serve on our State University Retirement board. I have agreed and I am currently collecting signatures so I can be placed on the ballot in February. Below is my candidate statement:

Aaron Ammons is currently employed at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana where he has served as a Building Service Worker for 14 years.

Aaron is the chapter president for the Service Employees International Union Local 73 which represents over 600 university employees in Champaign and 5000 in the SURS system. In this role he actively coordinates support and information for the pension issues SURS participants' face. He recently participated in the Harvard Trustee Leadership Program, learning best practices from pension fund trustees throughout the country.

Aaron has been active in Champaign- Urbana community for over 15 years and held an appointment as Chair of the Champaign County Jury Service Committee. He serves on the board of several local community organizations, and coaches' youth sports in his spare time.

As a trustee, Aaron will be a strong advocate on behalf of the participants in the SURS system. He will work to ensure continued, full funding for the system from the State of Illinois. He will emphasize maintaining a healthy, diversified investment portfolio.

"I know how important retirement security is to all SURS participants. I pledge to work diligently to protect benefits for current and future SURS participants and retirees. SURS participants need to have a strong, ethical voice at the table."

Furthermore, I have been sought after for several years to represent the people in Municipal Government. Due to the felony conviction, I have been unable to serve my community in that capacity. Interestingly, at this very moment the Mayor of the City of Urbana is poised to appoint me to the Urbana City Council to fill a vacancy that will occur in the middle of January 2015. If

I were to receive a pardon from the Honorable Governor Pat Quinn, I would be eligible to serve the people of Urbana Ward 3 as their next City Councilman.

In closing, I am humbly asking Governor Quinn to grant me a pardon. Why should I be granted this pardon? The information in this packet is clear evidence that I am a productive member of society who is deserving of full rights of citizenship. More importantly,

2012 Social Justice Award goes to Books to Prisoners program

CHAMPAIGN - The McKinley Presbyterian Foundation has selected Urbana-Champaign Books to Prisoners to honor as the community organization winner of this year's Social Justice Awards.

The awards were presented Saturday evening at a dinner

and reception.

Each year, the foundation honors two individuals and two organizations that have worked to help raise awareness of injustice issues and made significant strides to improve life for those who have received unfair treatment.

This year, five \$500 awards were made because there were so many excellent student organizations, and McKinley Presbyterian Church chose to sponsor an extra award, said Jane Cain, a development committee member.

Other honorees this year include two student organizations: Engineers Without Borders and Education Justice Project, both at the University of Illinois.

The two individuals honored were Frank Migliarese, a UI junior, and Aaron O. Ammons, a founding member of CU Citizens for Peace and Justice.

The cash awards go to the organizations, and individuals winning the awards donate them to the organizations of their choices, Cain said.

UC Books to Prisoners is an Urbana organization that gets freebooks to prisoners throughout the state and to those in jail McKinley Foundation. in Champaign County.

It developed libraries in the Champaign County downtown and satellite jails, both of which are stocked and staffed by volunteers, according to the McKinley Foundation.

Some volunteers have established a "sister" organization called Reading Reduces Recidivism, or 3Rs, to lobby at the state level to improve libraries in state prisons, according to the McKinley Foundation.

Cain said the organization has applied three times for the award.

'We've seen their growth and their expansion and influence in the community," she said.

Engineers Without Borders at UIUC, connected to the national organization, has been working consistently on three international projects in Cameroon, Nigeria and Guatemala focused on creating the infrastructure for a safe water supply to each selected region. Because the work is done with local citizens, the projects are considered partnerships, the McKinley Foundation says.

Education Justice Project of UIUC provides education programs to students incarcerated at Danville Correctional Center and hosts activities for their. family members in Chicago.

This organization "shows exceptional dedication by volunteers in advancing the interests of incarcerated people, their families and their communities in Illinois and in the nation at large," according to

The graduate student volunteers go to Danville to volunteer their time as tutors, offer science workshops and teach courses, and the undergraduate members conduct fundraiser and host events to help the work of the organization.

Migliarese, who is majoring in molecular and cellular biology at the UI, raised more than \$1,000 for research and scholarship for the Chicago Children's Hospital by running a marathon, counseled at a summer camp for the Great Lakes Adaptive Sports Association and participates and encourages others to participate in association activities, Cain said.

"Frank's commitment social justice manifests itself in helping people with physical disabilities and working to educate the public toward greater sensitivity, less stereotyping and more inclusive and accessible environments for all people," the foundation said in a statement.

Ammons, of Urbana, is a prelaw student in a dual program with Eastern Illinois University and the UI, Cain said.

"He has been tireless in his efforts for workers' rights, for better treatment for poor people in the court system, around issues of poverty, political enfranchisement, massincarceration, housing rights and environmental justice," the foundation said in a statement. "Aaron Ammons, in effect, is a strong voice in this community in working for justice for all."

Local group leads push for jury diversity

Chairman sees education as key to getting more minorities to serve

URBANA — A committee of citizens and public officials associated with the Champaign County court system is making progress educating minorities about the need to serve on juries, but they know there's more to do.

"Education, education, education," Aaron Ammons, chairman of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Jury Service, told members of the League of Women Voters on Thursday.

Ammons, an African-American who co-founded the Champaign-Urbana Citizens for Peace and Justice, has been on the committee since its inception in 2009.

Besides meeting periodically to figure out how to get more minorities to answer the call to jury service, Ammons and other committee members have appeared on radio call-in shows and at community events that draw large numbers of African-Americans to talk about the importance of service.

Reports compiled for several years by court watchers from the League of Women Voters and University of Illinois law students have shown an underrepresentation of minorities on juries sitting in cases involving minority defendants.

The committee was formed to see if the numbers could be improved.

"The diverse jury doesn't mean just more people of color. It means greater depth in deliberation. You have different perspectives, different experiences," Ammons said, which hopefully leads to verdicts that are "more well-thought out."

"It's a (mistaken impression) that citizens with felony convictions can't serve. That's not true. If you have a conviction, you can serve," he said, adding that lawyers who select the jurors have the final say in who sits in judgment of their client.

Another major accomplishment of the committee which could have ramifications far beyond Champaign County is the inclusion in the jury pool of people who are receiving unemployment benefits from the state.

Currently, prospective jurors come from lists of registered voters, licensed drivers, those with state of Illinois IDs, and those with certificates of disability.

Committee member Jennifer Putman, who formerly served on the Champaign County Board for many years, worked closely with Champaign County Public Defender Bandy Rosenbaum and Patricia Avery, former county board chairman and also a member of the jury committee, to get legislation passed that allows names from the Department of Employment Security to be added to the pool.

Sponsored in the House by state Rep. Naomi Jakobsson, D-Urbana, and in the Senate by Sen. Mike Frerichs, D-Champaign, it cleared both houses without any opposition. It takes effect Jan. 1.

"The goal isn't to have unemployed people on juries," said Putman. "It's to have valid addresses (to mail questionnaires to potential jurors.) It's true that if you aren't working, you would be able to say yes to serving."

Ammons, Putman and other committee members agree that the \$10-a-day pay for jury service in Champaign County likely keeps many from serving. Although employers may not fire or punish employees who choose to serve, there is nothing in the law that requires them to pay employees while they're on jury duty.

Putman said Jakobsson let the committee know there was no way a bill forcing employers to pay employees for jury service would fly in this economic climate.

Putman said the committee would like to have an "honor roll" of employers posted in the courthouse with the names of those companies that pay their employees who are onjury service.

But she said a comprehensive survey of county employers would need to be done. She asked for volunteers to conduct such a survey.

Black community members discuss issues involving children
