

1. Do you approve or condone such negative campaigning by anyone, including those who may vote for you?

Response - No, I do not condone or approve of negative campaigning by anyone, including those who may vote for me. Voters need to know the candidates and where they truly stand. The negative campaigning is confusing the voters, which does not help anyone make an informed decision. In 2018, I spoke up when I uncovered that the former township supervisor was misusing the taxpayer dollars allocated for low-income families as required to by law. A small group of people who benefited from his misdeeds has been retaliating against me for two years. Voters elect candidates to a four-year term as a township supervisor. I would be deeply concerned if he were elected to a supervisory role at the township. It would place our hardworking township staff at risk, given he would be the person overseeing all the township operations.
